

After much thought, I knew some quality time with my friend was worth the few dollars I would have to spend on a meal. As I glanced through the pricey menu, looking for deals and bargains, I tried to push thoughts of money away and focus on enjoying the atmosphere, food, and company.

When it came time to split the bill, she slipped right under my nose and paid for all of it herself. Despite my protests she would not let me pay her back, and I realised ashamedly I had not needed to spend all that time thinking about myself - my friend was already thinking about me, and she had it covered.

'No matter how far you've gone, you can come back', says former dealer turned drug educator

s a witness of domestic violence Tony Hoang grew up an angry child in Cabramatta NSW, often labelled the drug capital of Australia.

This anger led to over eight years of drug addiction, crime, and

"My earliest memory, going back when I was five or six years old, is of being in my room with my mother and my sisters. [My mother] was crying after my father had just beaten her... I remember feeling a frustration and rage in my heart," Tony says.

Now a happily married father of four, Tony is all smiles as he says: "My relationship with my father has been restored... My relationship with people has been restored - I speak to strangers on the street like they're my best friends. I have love in my heart..."

But that love was not always there. In his younger years Tony was full of hatred and distrust, and the rage he felt towards his father saw him joining a heroin-dealing gang where he thought he had finally found his true family.

With money and a newfound sense of belonging Tony thought he was happy.

"I didn't think about conse-

quences. I just thought: 'this is my new family. These are the guys that love me'. And so, because of that, I did what was asked."

SO FREE

No one visited 14-year-old Tony after being arrested for dealing drugs, which only led to more anger and disappointment

Upon his release he knew he had a choice to either return to school or to continue dealing.

"I made a dumb choice," Tony says, "and I continued dealing drugs for eight years of my life."

With the dealing came addiction and more violence, until he was looking down the barrel of a gun and running for his life as the bullets miraculously missed his body.

In this time he lost 13 of his friends and family, six of whom were murdered.

Tony recalls that he felt dead inside and could no longer stand the life he was living.

In a last act of desperation, he visited the church he attended as a child. He began to weep in the knowledge that if God were real He would be the only person to know all he had gone through.

"I said, 'God, if you died for me to live like this then I don't want to live. I'm at the end of myself'. So with tears running down my face I asked Him to please give me a sign."

The very next day, walking

through Cabramatta, Tony was drawn to a church group playing RnB music on the sidewalk.

As he approached them, one of the members handed him a flyer that read: "If you are looking for a sign from God, here it is."

Travellers in the Australian Outback are awed by its vastness. There is a lot of open space out there.

Recently, a tourist felt its loneliness and emptiness and nearly lost her life. With her husband, she walked for 15 minutes or so from the camp ground where they had spent the night. For some reason they lost sight of each other and became seriously separated.

The husband made his way back to the camp, trusting his wife was going to show up. But she was lost. The area was undulating with low bushes and looked fairly similar in all directions. Having no clear landmark coupled with loss of a sense of direction, the lady simply wandered.

Her husband soon became agitated and a search began. No trace was found that day. The operation escalated the following day with police and emergency workers becoming involved. Soon wide swathes of the landscape were being surveyed by helicopters while scores of volunteers scoured the earth.

Another unsuccessful day went by. Efforts were increased but the following day was also unsuccessful. On the morning of the third day, a movement was seen among the bushes and the lady was found. Cold, (the temperature was around four degrees overnight), and dehydrated. She had had nothing to eat or drink for the whole time. At night she had crouched among bushes to gain some shelter. Her husband was a much relieved man.



"I was amazed," Tony says. "I took that flyer and I was in awe of what I saw. I sat there and I listened to this guy tell me about the Gospel, about how Jesus came and died for my sins; things I knew in my head but didn't know in my heart.

"Right there on the street he asked me to pray, to ask God for a new life, to forgive me of my [wrongdoings]. So I did that," Tony smiles. "On the eighth of February 2004, I said that prayer that changed my whole life."

Tony asked the Lord into his heart to change him and make him new, and he says in that moment, in the middle of a street where he was known as a heroin dealer, he burst into tears of joy and restoration.

Not everything was smooth sailing from then $\,$ on. "It was hard for me to put that life away," Tony explains. "For eight, nine years of my life this was all I knew. It didn't happen overnight; I had to make some very difficult choices.

"But having come to Christ and knowing what He went through for me, I decided to make those choices, and today I'm clean. I'm free," he laughs.

"I'm so free, you can lock me up today and I'll still be free."

Today, Tony is a chaplain, youth worker, and pastor who aims to help young people avoid the life of addiction and crime he led for so long.

"I want them to know that it doesn't matter how far down that road you've gone, you can always come back," he says.

Walking wounded can be healed

Peace and healing can be found, says former radio celebrity

s a former radio presenter to 3.5 million South Africans Clint Davis has long understood that people share the same concern on where peace can be found.

"Some seek peace in yoga, but whatever it is – we are seeking peace - about this life, about our circumstances, our governance of our lives and what comes after this life," says Clint Davis, who recently filled-in on community radio in Australia.

Clint says he was walking wounded because he did not know the love of his father.

"My parents were church goers, but my stepfather was quite abusive physically and emotionally," he remembers

As he was raised in church, at age six, Clint says, "I remember committing my life to the Lord (Jesus)" but as he looked at his stepfather's lifestyle he adds, "It was easy for me to hold very loosely to what a Christian life looked like".

After graduating from a Bible

more disillusioned about God and Christianity.

"What I had seen on stage from some preachers at my church was not what I had seen behind the scenes," he recalls sadly.

As he departed from his religious heritage Clint found success at a music-focused Johannesburg radio station, a place where no one ever talked about God.

"If anybody is to know what commercial radio is like, look at the celebrities of today, and you will know how easy it is to be caught up in that world."

He says he was drifting, "as I was invited to 'celebrity events'" and caught up in "celebrity-ism", the hedonistic pursuit of fame and

"For six years I was speaking to about 3.5 million listeners every day, doing all kinds of shows, fill-in roles, all sorts of stuff," Clint says, recalling that he loved the rush of filling in on live TV as well.

Then Clint met a beautiful charm-

"I met my wife in the celebrity world. We felt that if we were heading towards marriage for real then we had to get into church."

Since they had seen broken lives and marriages where God was absent, they decided to pursue God for real and not attend church just for the social aspect.

"We sat on the back row as I wanted to be there for God and really rediscover Him," he says.

Clint and his wife then pursued freelance media work in Dubai for six years from 2009 and became involved in a church there.

sharing the stage with 'A list Celebrities'. Freelancing took a lot of faith for provision and taught me about our heavenly Father's heart.

"We started ministering into the different nationalities in that church and into other nations, and for

the last two years I worked on staff at the church we attended."

However, that fatherhood wound remained.

In counselling many others about fatherhood Clint recalls that God challenged him in an area

he had not dealt with: "How do I relate to God as Father?"

With the desire to "understand the heart of the father" and tell his biological father how Jesus had changed his life Clint says they connected over social media for several months.

"The months of difficult discussion was tough, emotionally draining. I met up with him when I was last in South Africa.

"Without dishonouring my father in any way, I felt God saying to me, 'You see now that I've been your Dad the whole time - I've guided and lead you. That might sound 'flakey' but that is the truth."

Clint believes that the way people experience fatherhood often taints their view of God, our heavenly

In those years where he believed God was absent, due to his father's earlier absence, Clint affirms that God had never left him alone.

"If our heart is breaking around the subject of fatherhood, I believe we

need to understand that the trinity of God is one in nature. God the Holy Spirit is here with us [speaking to us], and if we trust in Jesus the Holy Spirit is in us. The Holy Spirit carries the same father nature, as does God

> Now as he works in community radio in Australia, guest lectures at an Australian Bible college, teaches in a local church, Clint says he enjoys sharing the good news about Jesus everywhere.

"God has given me a gift to explain complicated things

in a simple way. I never used that when I was on commercial radio, but God did a 180 degree switch on these things when I gave it to him."

While some see Jesus as one of the answers to a weakness or hole in our life Clint says that "Jesus is everything".

Now we live in a broken world, Clint says, because we chose to be separated from His perfection, but Jesus has provided for us to have peace with God.

"Imagine I gave you a million dollars but until you go and draw that money out of the ATM you don't have it. In the same way, Christ died for all, but until you accept that free gift you don't have it.

"Once you do give Him governance over your life, a good God who only brings good things to His children and governance over your future, you will have His peace about where you'll be for eternity in heaven in God's Kingdom."



"I was permanently angry and jealous" Leana Bester says of her former life

a child together they married, but divorced nine months later. She had two more children to another man but admits she had no direction or purpose in life.

"My life was out of control," she describes. "I was doing wrong things and was not teaching my children about God as my parents had. I was permanently angry and jealous."

When she began shoplifting to support her children she was soon caught and sent to prison.

"God saw that I was messing my life up and took me away from all temptations," she recalls. "God allowed me to be sent to prison for the wrong I had done.

"I was very angry, hurt and sad at the time. I did not understand why, if there was a God, He allowed me to go to prison. I was shoplifting to look after my children. I asked myself how God could send me to prison when I was shoplifting for the right reasons. I blamed Him for my mistakes."

In prison Leana was went through Christian courses as part of a restorative justice program.

In the beginning, I did these courses with a heavy heart," she says. "But after a few weeks I began to enjoy the classes and was learning about God and His Word, the Bible.

"I never understood why God sent me to prison, but the more I read the Bible, the more I began to understand.

"I realised God wanted to save me from my sinful life (of rebelling against God's laws). He saw I was doing wrong and that I was living my own life, a life full of sin."

Leana says the Bible course that she did changed her life. Though, at first it was an effort to go along, she found she started to enjoy it and it changed her mind about God.

"After a few months I finally repented (turned away) from my sins and accepted Jesus as my personal Lord and Saviour," she says, trusting that God had forgiven all her sin through Jesus's sacrifice on the cross.

"God sent me to prison where I got to see how wrong my life was. I know now that I am a child of God. I want to go home and teach my children about God and His Word."

After becoming a born-again Christian, she recalls, "I started praying to my God and saw how He made my life better.

"I committed my life to God and am not an angry person anymore. I will keep on praising God.

"I know that I have changed. I am a better person. I am much friendlier and no longer swear and get worked up. I am patient and kind and people can see the difference in me. My mother said she could hear that I am a changed person when we spoke on the telephone recently.

"Now when I get angry I talk with God. I really enjoy talking to God, because He listens to my prayers.

"Since my conversion, God has made a huge difference in my life. He has healed my pain, hurt and insecurities. I am a much stronger person and I am able to forgive the people that have hurt me.

"God has protected me in very difficult situations here in prison and has helped me when I was lost. He is keeping my three beautiful children safe and gives them lots of love," she concludes.



Our ability to say no

Two researchers from the University of California, Roger Bohn and James Short, found that the amount of information consumed per capita by Americans increased by 60 per cent between 1980 and 2008 - from 7.4 hours a day to 11.8. Shockingly, these figures exclude working hours!

In a world so crowded with information and distraction, it is incredibly difficult to maintain focus on any one task. We can end up jumping from one input source to another and finish the day with information overload.

So what is the solution? It is the ability to say no. Choose what you will focus on at any one time and block out the rest.

One of Jesus' personal skills was that at times of extra pressure and expectation, He found guiet time to be with the Father rather than feeling like He always needed to do more.

It was wise then and it is even more important now.

POPULATION GROWTH EXPERTS tell us that the Earth's population grows at an average of 0.5% per year. Just a boring statistic that doesn't have anything to do with you, right? Wrong!



ight years after his lifestyle change, former gay activist Michael Glatze is still sending the media chattering as his story is told in a Hollywood movie "I am Michael" which stars gay actor James Franco and premiered at the Sundance Film Festival in January 2015.

Despite opposing views, there is mutual respect between Michael and the film's gay director and actors, so much so that they appreciated Michael thanking them for making the film.

Perhaps the reason for this respect is that Michael Glatze and his wife Rebekah say that their emphasis is unconditional love.

"We're here... to love everyone unconditionally," Michael told the Christian Post in 2014. "Our emphasis is on spreading the good news [of Jesus] to reach people, inspire them and serve the community."

Once a participant in gay rights rallies and the editor of two prominent gay magazines, Michael championed the cultural plasticity of sexuality and gender in major TV and magazine stories, and received the National Role Model Award from major homosexual-rights organization Equality Forum.

Michael's journey into homosexuality began at age 13 after his father's death. He recalls feeling "unable to handle my own masculinity" and as he became attracted to men "I decided I must be gay."

Wanting to champion the causes of young homosexuals, Michael says he worked for a gay magazine that he knew "bordered on pornography" knowing it was a stepping stone to more virtuous work. At 22, he became co-founder and editor of what he describes as a "not-so-pornographic" magazine. In his time there he co-produced Jim in Bold, the first major documentary film to tackle gay teen suicide.

Yet, he recalls a constant inner questioning of his motivations and lifestyle that others saw as mere idealism: "Even in the darkest days of late-night parties, substance abuse and all kinds of things... I felt like, 'Why am I here, what am I doing?"

"I would assume that since I'm a loving, kind person, then [my sexual attraction to men] must just be... a homosexual form of love. 'I'm not lusting, I'm not dirty, I'm loving,'" he said in a 2014 interview with Dr Joseph Nicolosi.

This assumption was false, according to Michael. He wrote in a WND.com column in 2007: "Under the influence of homosexuality... lust is a virtue, there is no homosexual desire that is apart from lust."

This lust is never satisfying, he explained, because it "takes us out of our bodies, 'attaching' our psyche onto

someone else's [desirable] physical form... Homosexuality causes us to forever pine for an outside physical object that we can never possess."

Michael shared with Dr Nicolosi that homosexual feelings were a lustful desire for another's masculinity, sometimes fuelled by "confusion", "terror", and the feeling, "I can't do what this guy is doing and I can't be what he is."

As the gay magazine he co-founded took off in 2005, Michael was asked to speak on the JFK Jr. Forum at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. It was after watching a videotape of his speech that Michael says, "I began to seriously doubt what I was doing with my life and influence."

Unsure of who to approach with his doubts, Michael says, "I turned to God."

"I'd developed a growing relationship with God, thanks to a debilitating bout with intestinal cramps caused by the upset stomach-inducing behaviours I'd been engaged in."

"I'd always been told that if you had doubts about the rightness of your homosexuality, which I had been having for a while but was trying to silence, that it was because you just hadn't worked through all your internalized homophobia. But that didn't feel true now," Michael explains.

As he studied the Bible, his hopes that

the Bible approved of his lifestyle were shot through. He remembers, "I began to understand things I'd never known could possibly be real, such as the fact that I was leading a movement of sin and corruption.

"It became clear to me, as I really thought... and prayed about it – that homosexuality prevents us from finding our true self within. We cannot see the truth when we're blinded by homosexuality."

He explained in a 2007 WND.com article that "Homosexuality, delivered to young minds, is by its very nature pornographic. It destroys impressionable minds and confuses their developing sexuality; I did not realize this, however, until I was 30 years old."

He stepped down as co-founder of XY Magazine in 2007 in dramatic fashion through a departing note left on his work computer: "I am straight", and as this felt true, he added, "Homosexuality = death. I choose life."

From studying the Bible Michael realized that "God creates us heterosexual", as reported by the NY Times in 2011.

In his "coming out" column in 2007 How a Gay Rights Leader Became Straight, Michael explained that when "tempted to lust. I noticed it, caught it and dealt with it". Instead of dwelling on lustful feelings Michael writes that he focused "on my God-given self".

"God loves you more than any dude will ever love you," Michael shared with NY Times reporter Benoit Denizet-Lewis in 2011. "We go from guy to guy, looking for someone to love us and make us feel O.K., but God is so much better than all the other masters out there."

Michael met wife-to-be Rebekah during studies at a Wyoming Bible college in 2011. They married two years later.

"As a Christian," Michael wrote in a World News Daily blog post in 2013, "I would be a liar if I did not tell who God is, what He has done in my life and how He continues to provide for me (and now – thank God – my family) in ways more numerous than I can count."

Is fear driving me to follow the crowd,

Cameron wondered

carfies on the grog! Scarfies on the grog!" shouted Kiwi uni student Cameron Mackenzie as he partied in a bar with his scarf-warmed Otago University peers.

Yet as the party rolled on Cameron recalls sensing a small inward voice, saying "There's more to life than this."

In the coolness of the morning he realised it was fear of not being accepted that was motivating his lifestyle, not enjoyment.

"I had this underlying fear of not fitting in or being seen as 'uncool', which impacted the things I did and said," Cam admits.

In his early school years he recalls that the occasional mockery of his ginger hair and freckles drove his desire for acceptance.

"I've heard it said that acceptance attracts while rejection repels," he reflects.

"For me, this means we are drawn towards that which accepts us whilst hiding from any sort of rejection."

He was raised attending church by religious parents, where he did not shy away from the cool activities.

"I did youth group, played drums in the music team and played sport on the weekend," Cam says.

However, as a 12-year-old he remembers seeing his priorities clearly while disconnected from outside social pressures at a youth group camp.

"In the outskirts of Canterbury, New Zealand the reality of God's love for me became real and in response I placed my faith in Jesus.

"In that moment, God came to live in-a-supernatural-but-very-true-way inside of me, and began His work of making me into the person He created me to be."



Cameron Mackenzie asked himself, "Why am I afraid of what my peers think?"

Years later, as he drank among his peers, Cam realised he was looking in the wrong place for acceptance.

At a Christian conference run by Student Life he newly considered the message of Romans 8, verse 31: "If God is for us, who can be against us?"

"I asked myself, 'if the God of the universe is for me, why am I afraid of what my friends think?'

"God used this verse to show me where my priorities were and that they needed to change if this verse is true."

He also learned what it means to be accepted.

"I learned that absolute acceptance is when someone (Jesus) dies for you."

As he trusted in what Jesus had done for him Cam gratefully responded in obedience to Him.

"I began to truly follow Jesus and live my life in a way which demonstrated the acceptance that I had come to know."

Going back to a less adventurous life in Australia led to difficulties in working out what her purpose in life was.

"I had to start from scratch again, such as finding something to study, finding a job, and even in some cases I had to start again with friends.

"Back in Perth, I found myself drifting. I was raised in a Christian family, but I no longer wanted to spend any time thinking about God or what He intended for my life," she admits.

Although she had no plan for what she wanted to do, Hayley says

many "really amazing coincidences" showed her God was not giving up on her.

"After some time, I finally realised this was part of God's plan. I gave church another go and joined a Bible study held in a coffee shop, which I am so grateful for."

As she studied God's goodness Hayley realised she had placed her trust in the wrong place.

"I was trusting in my ability and knowledge, when I should be trusting God.

"I was motivated to do this because of God's love for us. He never gives up on us – He is always there helping us to make the right choices."

Although she had known about God since she was a child, Hayley knew she needed to reaffirm her commitment to the Lord Jesus Christ.

BRITISH COACH FREES ATHLETES OF PRESSURE

Christine Bowmaker warns of media echo-chamber and says developing the person is her top priority

ormer British international sprinter Christine Bowmaker has made it her mission to coach Britain's top athletes to success in the cauldron of public pressure.

"I have been privileged to work with an Olympic, World and Commonwealth Champion and British number one sprinters over the 60m, 100m and 200m," says Christine, who formerly competed in the same distances and the 4x100m relay.

Great Britain's track performance has surged in the past year with nine new international senior and junior medallists. Christine coached one of them, Jodie Williams, to a silverwinning time in the 200m at the 2014 European Games.

This lift has occurred, Christine

told the BBC, because "the coaching has improved".

"You're looking after young people's lives, and you have to appreciate that. You coach the event, but you develop the person.

"I do a lot of reading, listening and watching. There's a sharing of ideas now. Coaches are becoming more professional in everything they do."

What sets Christine apart is her awareness of the false identity that the media and the public pushes on athletes.

"If [athletes] are not being talked about or written about their selfworth and value diminishes," she explains in a Back Pages magazine

"As long as the athlete is performing, everyone wants them in newspapers articles, on the television and in magazines, but they are quickly forgotten if injured or performances start waning."

Christine believes these athletes need a firm external foundation.

"Athletes need to see themselves as multi-faceted and not just as an athlete. That is the way God sees us and that is the way I have to see them."

As a devout Christian she says that her foundation is her relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ.

"I am the person I am today because I am a Christian," she shares in a YouTube video for Christians in Sport UK, referring to how she has surrendered control of

her life to Jesus Christ. "My identity is not found in track and field.

This is just a facet of who I am. God's given me a gift to be a coach. I believe that God wants me to be here, to make a difference and I believe that athletes need to see a difference."

Regardless of whether an athlete gains a medal, Christine points out from her own experience that "a void remains that only God can fill".

"When athletes enter the world of sport they don't realise how cut throat it is, so as a Christian coach, I feel it is my duty to make sure they know that I value them, how Christ values them, not as the world values

Christine admits she feels pressure from media and the governing bodies in sport, but people notice her different approach.

She tells these enquirers, "I am different because Christ is in control of my life, not the media and not British Athletics. Is the path that I walk easy? Certainly not. Do I feel overwhelmed at times? Yes I do."

It did upset her when a high profile athlete recently decided to change coaches, a crushing blow for many

"I thank God that He always affords us His good grace, and I try to do the same to others."

When Christine was a track and field competitor herself, she remembers that attending church and Bible study group leaders were essential to her spiritual growth, and she now does the same for others.

"At my second World Student Games, Jules Wilkinson (a Christians in Sport staff worker) and Ashley Nulls (sport chaplain) both helped me through those games."



Erie, which they describe as the worst algal bloom in the lake in decades.* In the 1950s, algal blooms were common due to high levels of phosphorus from farms, sewage, and industry. The phosphorus-rich nutrients promoted the bloom, but improved environmental practices in the 1970s reduced their occurrence. However, high phosphorus levels have returned, promoting a giant bloom in 2011.

Algae blooms kill fish, clog harbours, and are sometimes poisonous to people. They absorb the oxygen in the water creating dead zones where marine life cannot survive. They can appear very quickly—i.e. within just a

Half way through Noah's global Flood, conditions emerged that were conducive to algal blooms. The warm water, rotting vegetation, and decomposing animals produced the necessary nutrients for enormous blooms, which left their record as the vast chalk deposits found across the earth. It all happened quickly, contrary to the supposed millions of years of diatomaceous accumulation. (See creation.com/chalk.)

— there are many nicknames for methamphetamine. Destroying lives through ruined looks, the once beautiful smiles ravaged by drug use. Users shackled in self-induced slavery and reliance, the paranoia, violent reactions or freaky hallucinations. The results of methamphetamine use are shockingly destructive but I think the most frightening thing about methamphetamine is what it does to the brain.

Methamphetamine alters the brain to feel great pleasure by tampering with the way the brain manages its natural pleasure chemical, dopamine. Methamphetamine blocks the part of the brain that recycles dopamine, so the brain receives a huge dopamine hit.

This hit of pleasure, this huge high is so incredible that users become obsessed with achieving the same euphoria of their first hit. But the initial high cannot be recreated. After it wears off methamphetamine leaves the user worse off than before.

Methamphetamine destroys the body and mind. More and more methamphetamine is required to get a high. Normally gratifying activities lose their shine. The natural highs of life become less and less pleasurable the more someone takes methamphetamine. Even taking it once changes the way you look at the world.

A high called Eden

I wonder if Adam and Eve felt the same. They were created by God and placed in a beautiful, incredible garden called Eden. It must have been amazing, their normal every day must have been a great high; a dopamine hit, as they had nothing to worry about; great beauty to experience and the blessing of being able to walk with God in the garden. There was nothing to get in the way of them and God. It must have been a remarkable experience!

But when Adam and Eve disobeyed God, when they acted like their own gods and brought a curse on our world, the amazing garden and the beautiful closeness they had with God was gone. It must have been a huge shock to their system, from the great high of being close to God they were cast out of the garden, far from God.

I can only imagine how low they must have felt. Like a drug user coming off a high with no way of getting it back. The dopamine high of being in a sinless and curse-free world and walking with God each day — all lost.

Desperately holding out for closeness with God again, this withdrawal must have caused them great grief and depression. Surely Adam and Eve clung to the hope God would keep his promise to deal with sin so they would someday be able to be close to him again.

The hope of a promise fulfilled

While we have never experienced the high Adam and Eve would have felt we all know what it is to seek fulfilment, satisfaction and pleasure. Our world comes up with creative ways of trying to meet our every need, to give us a unsatisfying dopamine high. We were made for more than this

God is bringing people back to be close to Him. Through faith in Jesus we have the hope of a new heavens and a new earth. In Jesus we can have closeness and intimacy with our creator once more. The final book of the Bible reveals what this will be like. It describes the restoration of Eden, where God dwells with His people. Where there will be no more curse of sin. The mediocre highs of life will be replaced with the supernatural high of being with God, an everlasting high that will never disappoint. A high that's worth looking forward to.

CLEAN SLATE after miserable past

buse, rejection, addictions, abortions, depression and even time in prison could not keep Kathy Hunt from accepting an unbelievable offer of a new life.

After being molested by a family member, Kathy thought being abandoned in a children's home at age 11 was the rescue plan and answer to this scared little girl's prayers

Then, after being diagnosed with multiple personalities, no one would believe her when she confessed to being gangraped by some of the boys living there.

Feeling "ripped into pieces", Kathy recalls turning to drugs, alcohol, prostitution, lesbianism, and gangs after she fled her abusers by hitch hiking with truckers.

"Bitterness and anger boiled within me and I asked myself: why was I even born? I attempted suicide and thought I might as well give sex away so it couldn't just be taken from me. Abortions became my method of birth control," she admits.

Abusive marriages followed and Kathy struggled to bring up the children she had amidst her unstable home life and addictions to methamphetamine, marijuana and cocaine.

The drugs were still not enough to numb her pain and Kathy says she clung to the hope of 'one day' and would "talk towards the Heavens" in the hopes that if God existed, He would keep her safe and make all the bad things stop.

Throughout her life she had dappled in various religions and cults but says most of it had been forced upon her.

"I had been baptized in the mountains of Dakota while at a summer camp at age 12, yet I did not truly and wholeheartedly believe that Jesus was real at that point," Kathy admits.

It was only a year after the death of her 12-day old son, Kathy says she began to understand who the real Jesus was.

She had been attending a small church

with a pastor who motivated and inspired her to read the Bible, despite battling dyslexia.

"It was there I began to believe that there really is a Saviour and His name is Jesus," she explains.

"As I read the Bible I began to pray 'God please make the Bible, your Word, come alive to me so I will know without a shadow of a doubt that You are real'."

God answered this prayer in a personal way after her youngest son was born and the baby's father was incarcerated.

"I prayed like never before, crying out to God, 'I know there is more to you than this, show me who you are!' I knew there was nothing left for me to do but give God all I had."

Kathy wanted to trust in Jesus Christ, despite her doubts, and prayed earnestly that God would allow His Holy Spirit to come into her life and help guide her.

"Deep in my heart all I could feel was a strong sense of assurance, and later I saw it was really in that moment of time that God was touching my life," she says.

God answered her prayers for help but, despite her genuine commitment, the doubts that God would continue to provide resurfaced and Kathy confesses she made some bad decisions "to get ahead".

After skipping probation on drug charges in 2007, Kathy was arrested in 2009 and was sentenced to five years in maximum security prison, where she says she was finally able to make a fresh start.

Released on probation after 18 months, Kathy vowed not to return to her old ways but instead search for God's direction, which lead her to begin an internship in a Christ-centred transitional home and become a certified instructor for two faith-based '12 step Overcomers Support Groups'.

"God blessed me and gave me a sound foundation to stand on. I excelled far beyond my own dreams and ambitions," she says joyfully after putting all her trust in Jesus.

Although she once felt completely alone, believing that no one understood the pain hidden deep inside her, Kathy now she says God has given her a new outlook on life.

"Jesus met me right where I was, accepting me just as I was, and helped me understand the mercy and grace [undeserved kindness] of a living God who loves us unconditionally," she explains.

"I have been able to let go of so many emotional scars because I believed the Scriptures when it says 'For whom the Son [Jesus] sets free is free indeed!'

"Pain runs deeper the longer we carry and hide it from God. When I acknowledged and confessed my sins, God met me in the middle."

In 2014 Kathy completed all her parole requirements and programs.

She says, "I am so excited about the fresh start I have ahead of me, and what God has in store for me."

Essence of a real man

or years Johan Kemp believed he would be a social outcast if he did not act like a "real man" – one who drank, smoked and cursed – yet he desperately wanted something more in life.

"These pleasures did not last and did not fill the gap in my heart," Johan explains. "I had an emptiness inside that needed to be filled."

Although raised in a religious household, Johan says, "I chose to smoke from age 13 and began drinking while still at school because I did not feel part of the crowd."

However, matching other's smoking and drinking was not enough, as Johan admits that soon he was "swearing just as they did, or exceeding their efforts."

At work one day he noticed a sudden peace had settled over a formerly angry co-worker and immediately wanted to know more

"This man went home red with anger and came back to work green with peace the next day," says Johan.

"I thought that it was a show or a charade, because I have never seen a man change 180 degrees in attitude. I wanted to see what caused this dramatic change overnight in a person's life."

His curiosity led him to attend the church his coworker had started going to.

"At his church, I learned that all humans had a choice as to where they want to spend eternity. You just had to realise that you are born a sinner, repent (turn away) from your sins and accept the Lord Jesus into your life."

A few Sundays later in October 2009, Johan remembers a sermon that spoke about the same three sins that were present in his life.

As he listened, Johan says, "I

realised that I had to receive Jesus' forgiveness and He would help with my drinking, smoking, and swearing.

"I had a desire to be fulfilled like the changed man that I worked with."

As he heard that

sermon, Johan says,
"I prayed to God that
I wanted Him in my
heart, but there was still the
battle with alcohol abuse,
smoking and swearing, which I
could not stop by myself."

"I prayed that He could help me to get that out of my life, fill that emptiness in my heart. So He did. I stopped drinking immediately without any effects. I stopped smoking after 38 years of addiction without any side effects – no cravings and no remedies. I also stopped swearing and road rage dropped out of my system

overnight."

"In one prayer", Johan says, "Jesus made me free of my addictions."

Although not all new Christians experience an immediate freedom from addictions in their lives, Johan is testament to the fact that anything is possible for God.

"Without looking back I laid my struggles down and believed in what He did for me on the cross. And Jesus forgave my sins and gave me the right to be called a child of God."



WHAT IS FALLING IN LOVE?



NEW START MENU: For desktop users the Windows 10 start menu now looks like the old Windows 7 start menu, but with resizable live tiles added, which function like the Windows 8 Start Screen tiles. Turning off your PC is 1-2 clicks as per Windows 7. Right-click on Start for the 'power user menu'.



'CORTANA' SEARCH: Cortana is a 'smart' assistant (like Google Now

or Siri on iOS), which sits on the taskbar next to the new Start Menu. Using your voice or keyboard you can input any action, question or search query. It is still faster to find a file on your PC via Start menu search box. Cortana is also on Windows 10 Mobile for phones, and on Windows 10 tablets.

UNIVERSAL APPS: On the new Windows App store, there are desktop apps and new 'Universal Apps' that will simultaneously install on your desktop, mobile or tablet if it has Windows 10. At last Windows Store apps will float on your desktop rather than take up the whole screen.

TASK VIEW (APP SWITCHER): Hit Windows Key + Tab, or tap on the 'Task View' taskbar button, where you can switch apps and virtual desktops, or 'Add a desktop'. This is just like the OS X app switcher, plus 'Snap Assist' that can tile up to four apps. Alt+Tab switches between apps on your current (virtual) desktop.

ACTIONS CENTRE: Click on the 'speech bubble' icon in the system tray to bring up a list of Notifications (emails, appointments, system maintenance, etc.), plus Quick Actions for common tasks like Airplane Mode, Wi-Fi,


Bluetooth and other settings. The clunky Windows 8 Charms menu is gone.

WHAT IS MISSING? Removed features include Windows Media Centre, Windows 7 Desktop Gadgets and Microsoft Hearts (Solitaire and Minesweeper were moved to the Windows Store). Windows RT devices cannot be upgraded.

You will need to install separate DVD and Blu-ray playback software, like the software included with your disc player, or free software like VLC Player (videolan.org), MPC-HC, or PotPlayer (for Blu-ray).

Windows 10 Home will not be able to turn off automatic important Windows Update patches. If you have Windows 7 Pro or Windows 8 Pro, you will be upgraded to Windows 10 Pro which will have this option. To upgrade from Win 10 Home to Pro is a \$130 "Pro Pack" purchase via the Windows Store.

DO YOU HAVE XP OR VISTA? I would not recommend XP or Vista owners buy Windows 10 until they are forced to buy a new PC that has it pre-installed. Otherwise, try picking up an old Windows 7 or 8 license and install media, then get the free direct upgrade to Windows 10. The spec requirements are almost the same as Windows 8 or 8.1, so check your PC can run Windows 10 via the 'Windows 8 Upgrade Assistant' (do a web search). For good performance you will need a PC under five years old with a dual-core 64 bit processor and 2GB RAM. •

2015 NBA Most Valuable Player Stephen Curry of the Golden State Warriors shows great humility even though many consider him one of the greatest shooters of his time

he son of Dell Curry, an NBA player from '86 to '02, Stephen Curry beat his own NBA season record in 2015 with 286 three-pointers, leading the Warriors to their first NBA championship in 40 years and an NBA-best 67 wins.

The field-goal specialist – with 47% career accuracy and a game-point average above 20 – is also a two-time NBA All-Star and dual Olympic gold medallist, having helped USA to victory at the 2010 and 2014 Olympic Games.

Along with his awe-inspiring talent, the 27-year-old also has tremendous humility, as displayed in his MVP speech.

"First and foremost I have to thank my Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ for blessing me with the talents to play this game and with the family to support me day in day out," Stephen began.

"I am His humble servant right now, and I cannot say it enough how important my faith is to how I play the game and who I am. So I am just blessed and thankful for where I am."

Stephen has fond memories of playing well into the night on his backyard basketball court in Charlotte, North Carolina.

But it did not always look as though Stephen would have a promising career in the sport, as all the schools he tried out for took a pass on him during the recruitment process.

"I had my sights set on Virginia Tech during my high school years," he recalls. "Unfortunately, the Hokies and other ACC schools weren't interested."

Stephen was determined not to give up on his dream and, when head basketball coach of the Davidson College Wildcats Bob McKillop offered him a chance to play for the modest school, he took it.

In 2009 he became the seventh pick in the NBA draft, joining up with the Golden State Warriors

Later in the 2011-2012 season, when ankle injury after ankle injury and surgery after surgery saw him missing 40 out of the 66 games, he approached the frustrating situation with the same attitude of patience and resilience.

"He had a pretty rough year and a half when it comes to his ankle injuries," his wife Ayesha says. "But there has never been a day that he has had a frown on his face... It's to the point where I'm in awe and shock. How do you not bring all of that stress home with you?"

Stephen has a simple answer: "I know that in the grand scheme of things, this is just a game that can be taken from me at any moment."

Instead of depending on his performance Stephen chooses to rely on something more permanent for happiness: the day he gained everlasting life.

"I remember it like it was yesterday, the day I gave my life to Christ," says Stephen.

"I was in fourth grade, and I recall hearing and understanding the gospel of Jesus Christ and walking down the (church) aisle to give my life to Him."

Since that moment Stephen knew his whole life – every circumstance, every course of action – was not in his hands but in God's hands.

And he knew as long as God was writing his story he had nothing to worry about.

So when no schools seemed to accept him, he decided to keep his trust in the Lord who, it turns out, had a greater plan.

"I was confident the Lord had blessed me with the talent to play the game, and I just wanted to go where He wanted me to be. That place became as clear as day to me once I met Bob McKillop... he was a man of God, so it was an added bonus to play for a leader who was grounded in faith," Stephen recalls.

"The entire recruiting and signing experi-

ence taught me about patience and seeking God's will, because He had a plan all along. I couldn't see it at the time, but I trusted He knew what was best for me."

Stephen trusted God in the same way when his injuries stopped him from playing. Knowing his Heavenly Father was taking care of him took away any frustration about the present or worry about the future.

Stephen focuses on playing and enjoying

the game instead of letting it be the be all and end all of his success and joy.

And the Bible verse he has written on his sport shoes, Philippians chapter 4 verse 13, lets others know where his talent really comes from: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me".

"I love that

basketball gives me opportunities to do good things for people and to point them towards the Man who died for our sins on the cross," he says.

"I know I have a place in heaven waiting for me because of Him, and that's something no earthly prize or trophy could ever top.

"There's more to me than just this jersey I wear, and that's Christ living inside of me." •
